



THE IMPORTANCE OF WESTERN SYDNEY

AUSTRALIA'S ECONOMIC GROWTH CENTRE



The population of the Western Sydney's Parkland City is projected to grow from 740,000 in 2016 to 1.1 million by 2036, and to well over 1.5 million by 2056.

The city will be established on the strength of the new international Western Sydney Airport (\$5.3 billion dollar investment) and the surrounding Aerotropolis.

It will be a polycentric city capitalising on the established centres of Liverpool, Greater Penrith and Campbelltown-Macarthur.

The Western Sydney Airport and the surrounding Aerotropolis will create an economic corridor that will attract globally significant defence and aerospace activities and contribute to a strong trade, freight, logistics, advanced manufacturing, health, education and science economy. This will produce knowledge-intensive jobs close to areas of high population growth and drive the development of the corridor and the metropolitan cluster.

Due to the importance of the region, Federal, State and Local Governments have all agreed to enter into a partnership through the Western Sydney City Deal which sets out the agreed commitments that will unlock opportunities in education, business and employment for the Western City and its people. The Western Sydney City Deal lays the foundation for its transformation and delivery of key elements of the Australian Government's Smart Cities Plan, the Greater Sydney Commission's Western City District Plan, and the Future Transport 2056 strategy.
